Teach Us To Pray

Over the past several weeks, we've been exploring the Lord's Prayer, asking Jesus to do the very thing He did for the disciples: "Lord, teach us to pray" (Luke 11:1). We have seen that this somewhat simple and very well-known prayer is loaded with depth and meaning. The Lord's Prayer is incredibly profound, especially considering how succinct it is, and it certainly provides an excellent template for our prayers, let alone making it part of our daily prayer routine.

More Than Knowing How

But knowing "how" doesn't always get us to the point of actually "doing." We all know how to eat well, but still eat too many French fries. We all know how to exercise, but we still watch too much TV. Over time, we get stuck in routines and habits that unintentionally create hurdles and obstacles that keep us from doing what we know we ought to do. Or we find ourselves facing a difficult situation (like a large pizza) that keeps us from doing what we know we ought to do (not eat an entire large pizza). There comes a time when we need to hit a "reset" button and start over. Cultivating a habit and lifestyle of prayer is no different. It's far too easy to allow the busy-ness and stress of our daily lives to fill our schedules, leaving us with the feeling that we're too busy to pray. Or we run into a situation where we really have no idea how to lift that up in prayer.



A Spiritual "Reset" Button

That's one of the reasons why Lent is one of my favorite seasons of the liturgical year. It's an opportunity to hit that spiritual "reset" button. Lent is an Old English word that means "springtime." Spring is a season where we clean up the muck of the past year to prepare our yards for new growth and to freshen and straighten our homes. Spiritually, the season of Lent provides the same opportunity. It's an opportunity to restart some old habits that have been lost or begin new habits out of a desire to clean the spiritual muck out of our hearts and souls to make room for the new spiritual growth the Holy Spirit has in store for us. We take advantage of this season by setting aside some bad habits that are keeping us from praying, or starting new habits to enable us to pray more effectively.

On Sundays during Lent, we'll use the prayer book of the Hebrews, the Psalms, as our guide to praying through some of the more challenging things that come up in our lives. Over the course of this series, we'll look at the problem of prayer, how to approach the Inapproachable, how to pray when we've done wrong, how to cultivate a trust that never stops, how to pray when there is no hope, and what rejoicing really looks like.

May this season of Lent and our time spent in the Psalms nurture and encourage your soul.


If another date suits you better than the one suggested, feel free to change the date.

MISSIONS GIVING FOR 2018


We were able to support 18 individual missions and ministries in 2018 with your generous contributions and from budgeted funding. A total of \$17,580 was given which equals 10.6% of all the income in 2018.

Aside from monetary support, we offer our facilities to the Amherst Recreation Department Seniors Group, Amherst County Habitat for Humanity, and Amherst Emergency Recovery Group. Pastor David serves on both boards of the last two mentioned groups. And a number of our people volunteer their time with ministries outside of our church.

LIBERTY UNIVERSITY CHAMBER SINGERS


IN CONCERT AT NORTHMINSTER EPC

**What 21st-Century Christians Can Learn
From The Early Church
A Lent 2019 Table Talk Series
Beginning Wed., March 13**

Those who study and observe the ebb and flow of culture say that we are no longer a “post-Christian” culture but have actually returned to a “pre-Christian” state. If that is true, we would do well to take a closer look at the Early Church and see what we can learn in order to more

faithfully live and effectively share the Gospel of Jesus Christ. Here’s what each week of this series will focus on:

March 13: “How the Early Church Was Made”

Acts gives us the “formula” for how the early church was made: the ministry of prayer and the power of the Holy Spirit. This first session will look at God’s blueprint for the church as laid out in scripture and illustrated in the first century.

March 20: “Going, Loving, Dying: The Missionary Church in Action”

The early church was a missionary church. It was a church that went to the ends of the earth, just as Jesus had commanded. The early church was also known for its love.

March 27: “Lessons from the Catacombs”

Were you taught that the catacombs were places of refuge in times of persecution? Did you learn that the fish symbol was a secret message? Well, think again! There are many persistent myths about the catacombs. These burial places did, in fact, serve an important purpose in the early church—but it’s not entirely what you think.

April 3: “Contending for the Faith: Heresy and Orthodoxy”

The battle over “sound doctrine” was the defining challenge of the early church. To this day, we recite creeds that were formulated in direct response to false teachings. Docetism, gnosticism, Arianism—these heresies struck at the very heart of the gospel by redefining the person and work of Jesus Christ.

April 10: “Constantine: The Church’s Worst Nightmare?”

On the evening of October 27, 312, as Constantine was standing near the Milvian Bridge in Rome he saw a vision that forever changed his life, the Christian Church, and the western world. But did he really see a vision? The results were unmistakable. Constantine dramatically “converted” to Christianity and the status of the western church would never be the same. This session will explore what happens when the church makes common cause with politics.

April 17: “The Death Throes of Paganism”

By the end of the Roman period, Christianity had triumphed over paganism in Europe. Temples and idols were destroyed. Pagan institutions were shut down. Profane literature was censored and burned. This session will explore how Christians of every age must be vigilant in defending the purity of the church.

PER-MEMBER ASKING FOR THE PRESBYTERY OF THE MID-ATLANTIC SUPPORT

The Presbytery of the Mid-Atlantic of the EPC asks its churches for their financial support in the amount of \$25 per Active Member. They call this the ***EPC Per-Member Asking***. Although this is not mandatory, Northminster has pledged to financially support our denomination, realizing they have expenses just as we have. We have on several occasions reaped benefits from the Presbytery at no charge to us. Active members are asked if they can *voluntarily* give to this fund, beyond their regular tithe, once a year. If you are able to do so, please use a pew envelope or include \$25 in your offering envelope designating "EPC Per-Member Asking".

UPDATE – PCUSA DISMISSAL DEBT

Due to your faithful giving over the past 3 years, we feel like we can reach our goal within 1 more year. You will see below in the Financial Stewardship Report that we have \$47,473 towards the balance owed (\$60,000). If we are to have the full amount within the next year, we ask everyone who has been giving toward the PC USA Dismissal Debt to continue to give their same amount for 1 more year.
