The Only Difference That Matters

Now if Christ is proclaimed as raised from the dead, how can some of you say that there is no resurrection of the dead? But if there is no resurrection of the dead, then not even Christ has been raised. And if Christ has not been raised, then our preaching is in vain and your faith is in vain. We are even found to be misrepresenting God, because we testified about God that he raised Christ, whom he did not raise if it is true that the dead are not raised. For if the dead are not raised, not even Christ has been raised. And if Christ has not been raised, your faith is futile and you are still in your sins. Then those also who have fallen asleep in Christ have perished. If in Christ we have hope in this life only, we are of all people most to be pitied.

— 1 Cor. 15:12–19



There are a lot of things about the Christian faith that are unique and special, that differentiate it from all of the other religions and philosophies throughout history. But nothing is more important than what we celebrate on Easter Sunday. It is the resurrection of Jesus Christ that makes all the difference. As Paul writes in the passage above, if Jesus Christ wasn't bodily raised from the dead on Easter, then everything we believe as Christians completely falls apart. Even more, our eternal hope disintegrates. It's easy to become complacent about our Easter celebrations, but we should make the effort to avoid falling into that trap.

In the fifteenth chapter of 1 Corinthians, Paul explains so well how essential the resurrection of Jesus Christ is to our faith. As quoted above, he first says that if Christ wasn't raised from the dead, then our faith is futile. He then points out that Christ has, in fact, been raised from the dead so that "as in Adam all die, so in Christ shall all be made alive." (1 Cor. 15:22). It is because of the resurrection that we are baptized, which is a symbolic dying and rising again. It is because of the resurrection that we are able and even willing to endure hardship, persecution and suffering for the sake of Christ.

Paul then describes what the resurrected body will be like: a very real body, but also a spiritual body. All of the weaknesses and imperfections of the natural body replaced with the perfection and strength of the spiritual body. It is because of the resurrection of Christ that the power of death has ultimately been broken. What causes fear for the unbeliever is the source of our greatest hope.

We are all looking for God to restore and redeem our lives. What we're looking to have restored varies from person to person. It might be mental, physical, or emotional restoration, but it's certainly spiritual as well. Christ's death on the cross provided for our spiritual redemption. Christ's resurrection from the grave promises our eternal restoration. Sometimes, God brings restoration to us while we're on this side of glory. Whether He does or not, because of Easter Sunday, we can know, beyond the shadow of a doubt, that one day our restoration will be full and complete, because if Christ rose from the dead, so shall we. Praise the Lord!

When the perishable puts on the imperishable, and the mortal puts on immortality, then shall come to pass the saying that is written:

"Death is swallowed up in victory."

"O death, where is your victory?

O death, where is your sting?"

The sting of death is sin, and the power of sin is the law. But thanks be to God, who gives us the victory through our Lord Jesus Christ. — 1 Cor. 15:54–57

A MUSICAL EASTER EGG by Bob Mills

In my younger days, I enjoyed participating our town's annual Easter egg hunt. It was held on the Little League field; little kids on the infield, big kids in the outfield. Not until I became a big kid did I notice that while the infield was freshly mowed, the outfield appeared to have laid undisturbed since Thanksgiving.



In the intervening decades, "Easter egg" has acquired a more technological application. In computer program, movie, and video game parlance, an Easter egg is a message, picture, or feature that's hidden in the software. Like many of the Easter eggs I corralled on the short infield grass, these digital delights often hide in plain sight. You just have to know where to look.

That observation leads me to one of the world's great pieces of Easter music, the chorus "Hallelujah" from Handel's oratorio *Messiah*.

The Hallelujah Chorus? Easter music? Really? Yes!

Messiah has more than 50 movements divided into three parts. Part I, often described as the Christmas portion of the oratorio, starts with Old Testament prophecies of Jesus' coming and continues through his birth. Performances of Part I often end with the Hallelujah Chorus. And for this reason, the Hallelujah Chorus is often linked with the Christmas season.


But that wasn't Handel's intent. He put the Hallelujah Chorus at the end of Part II, which musically describes "the accomplishment of redemption by the sacrifice of Jesus." In its original context, the Hallelujah Chorus is a triumphant celebration of Jesus' resurrection. It's an Easter anthem hiding in plain sight.

Minute 4 Missions Burundi Hope



"Open My Eyes," a hymn written by Panam Percy Paul, comes to mind when thinking of Burundi and the mission we help to support there. The song begins with a plea to God saying, "Open my eyes that I may see, glimpses of truth Thou hast for me." It continues on with the words: "Open my ears that I may hear voices of truth Thou sendest clear." This is what is happening with the Burundi Hope Project at the Kanura School for the Blind and at the Ephphatha Deaf School. The students literally cannot hear or see!

In 2004, Mark and Susan May had a vision to establish the Burundi Hope Project which enabled them to establish schools for 220 deaf or blind students and their teachers. Mark and Susan have a heart for serving children with special needs; now they both serve as short-term missionaries in Burundi. Living in Amherst County and being one of our own, makes this project special to us. Therefore, Northminster has supported them in their mission for a number of years. We have seen them here at our church many times when they have given us updates on how the work there is progressing. They are our friends. And most importantly, supporting their work is one way Northminster can fulfill God's mission of spreading the Word throughout the nations of the world.

Mission strategy has changed through the years. In the past, missionaries went and never came back home. Today's strategy allows the people in Burundi to take ownership of their projects, with missionaries becoming more or less advisors. When in Madison Heights, Susan and Mark work with folks in Burundi by way of the Internet. Then, at least twice a year, sometimes more, they do short-term mission trips. Besides the schools, Mark and Susan have also seen the people establish a fish farm, a sewing center, a chicken business, and new churches. Burundi Hope also provides training for pastors and teachers.

On Easter morning when I was a kid, my father would clomp down the stairs in his suit and big, black dress shoes to shout, "He is risen!" into the darkness of our first-floor bedrooms. My brother and I, barely coherent in our cozy beds on opposite sides of the hallway would croak, "He is risen indeed," with far less enthusiasm. It was Easter Sunday, and we were getting up before the crack of dawn to attend the Easter sunrise service. We lived in New Jersey, so we never actually *saw* the sun rise because it was usually cold and cloudy, but there was always the service to attend with a breakfast to follow.



As a kid, I didn't really appreciate Dad's pre-dawn enthusiasm, although when I did finally wake up, I enjoyed the day. I remember the Easter baskets Mom spent so much time and effort making, and the Easter eggs she dyed with us the day before, and the fun time with my grandparents and great aunts who came over for Easter dinner, but I also remember with such clarity Dad's early morning announcement.

Looking back now, from a middle-aged life filled with much more experience—a life that has seen pain, struggled with faith, and said goodbye to loved ones, I have a new and deeper appreciation for Dad's unbridled Easter joy. "He is risen!" Death has lost its sting! The tomb is empty, and the grave has been defeated! Jesus lives and His resurrection means that I will see my dear loved ones when I, too, die. It means that no matter what happens in my life, as long as Easter happened, everything will be alright in the end.

I wish I could travel back to those days as a kid and wake up once again to hear Dad tromping down the stairs followed by Mom dressed in her Sunday best and hear Dad yell, "He is risen!" I would answer him with much more joy, hope, and excitement. "He is risen indeed!" Hallelujah! What a Savior!
