
JOIN US FOR TABLE TALK, BEGINNING JANUARY 10!

OUR 2018 MISSION – HOW DOES IT MATCH UP WITH CHRIST'S?

Jesus made it very clear what His mission was – what He "came for". In Luke 19:10 Jesus says this: "The Son of Man came to seek and to save the lost." And, from the list of people we see Him drawn to, there's no question Jesus meant what He said. Writer Chris Tiegreen reminds us that Jesus sought out and was concerned with a dishonest tax collector, a prostitute, a raging, demon-possessed lunatic, an adulteress, beggars, lepers, and just about everyone else who had no legitimate case to make about their own righteousness and well-being.

And so the question is, do we, as individuals and as a church, feel the same passion for these types of people, and do we feel as compelled as Jesus to reach out with God's message to our community, so that people like these, and just everyone in general, can find out about our Lord's care for them and His desire to rescue them?

If Christ was so drawn to sinners, and those in general who needed Him, shouldn't the body of Christ be equally drawn? If our identity is in Jesus, and His Spirit is living in us, we will indeed be drawn to others as He was (and still is). And, if we do feel that way, Chris Tiegreen says that we will be broken-hearted about those who suffer in sinful conditions. When that is true, then the zeal of our search to bring redemption to a lost world will reflect His zeal.

We cannot on our own generate this type of zeal, but the more time we spend with Jesus, the more of His priorities and concerns will "rub off" on us. As James Dobson was fond of saying, lots of things in the Christian life are more "caught" than "taught".

So... my humble prayer for our church is that we indeed "spend more time with the Lord" by reading His Word, by praying for insight about what His Word is telling us about His priorities and ways, by regularly fellowshipping with other Christians (to encourage them, be encouraged by them, and be held accountable by them), and to spend some regular alone-time just listening for God's voice and direction (yes – we will need to DILIGENTLY search for this alone-time, because just "hoping" it happens is a fruitless endeavor in a world that will pull us in every direction EXCEPT toward closeness with God).

My further prayer is that, with Jesus' same passion for the lost, we will examine our programs, activities, and ministries, and make sure we are looking for ways to include our community in those things, and to make sure we are thinking of our community when we decide on what our programs, activities, and ministries will be. If we do, then hopefully, when people in our community think of a church where they will be cared for, ministered to, and loved like Jesus would do, they will think of Northminster.

That is the type of thinking we were encouraged to take on when we were led in our Fall retreat by Ken Priddy, and I pray it's one we sincerely pursue. To the extent we do that, I do believe we will see our Lord Jesus moving in Northminster in ways we all pray for and hope for. 2018 holds many opportunities for us, and I sincerely believe we will see our Lord work in helpful and exciting ways as we allow His priorities to be ours, and as each one of us involves ourselves in His mission.

CHURCH CANCELLATION -- IN CASE OF INCLEMENT WEATHER

Sunday Services:

When Sunday services are questionable due to bad weather, we will follow this procedure:

- A decision will be made by 7:30 a.m. Sunday morning
- A telephone message will be sent out to everyone using the church's One-Call Now telephone service.
- We will post the cancellation on the church web-site <u>www.npcmh.com</u> and record a message on the church answering machine.

Programs other than Sunday morning:

Cancellations regarding events other than Sunday morning will be decided as soon as reasonably possible. You will be notified using the church's One-Call Now telephone service. We will also put a message on the church answering machine.

In every instance, it would be very helpful if each person would notify someone in the congregation.

Because of your faithfulness to your pledge to our Campaign to pay off our commitment to the PC USA, we have made our 3rd annual payment of \$7,400. We also have a head start on next year's payment. [Notice <u>Pledges to Campaign</u> in the chart *below*.]

Our goal of the "Campaign" when we left the PC USA was to obtain the funding to pay off our indebtedness within 6 years. 2018 will be the 3rd year of this effort.
