Too Good to be True?

On Sunday mornings the past few weeks we've been exploring the idea of Lent as an opportunity for us to have "Springtime for our Soul" (you can get caught up on that idea by reading last month's article and listening to the sermons at www.npcmh.com/teaching). One of the central themes running through this series is that God loves us, delights in us, knows us, and desires for us to abide in Him (John 15). For many of us, this idea sounds good in theory, but in reality we suspect too good to be true. There's no way God could love me that much. In fact, just the other day someone asked me, "Doesn't God sometimes just turn His love off?"



What a fantastic question! And aren't there times when we all feel that way? Maybe God loves me in general, but he's sure turned it off lately!

God is Love

Thank goodness for the apostles and the Bible! In 1 John 4:8 and again in 16 it says, "God is love." God is entirely made up of love, so it would be impossible for God to "turn off" His love. If He were to do that, He would cease to exist. Paul writes in Romans 8, "For I am convinced that neither death nor life, neither angels nor demons, neither the present nor the future, nor any powers, neither height nor depth, nor anything else in all creation, will be able to separate us from the love of God that is in Christ Jesus our Lord." (Romans 8:38–39)

Yeah, But You Don't Know...

No, I don't know. I don't know what you've done, I don't know what's in your heart. I don't know the hurts and wounds you carry. But I know that God does. And I know this: that God loved you this much even before you were saved (see verse 8 at the beginning of this article). And I know that the verses from Romans 8 say that there's nothing in heaven or on earth that could separate you from His love. How wonderful that God's amazing love for us doesn't depend on our believing or accepting it!

As the temperature slowly warms up over this month, may the warmth of God's love saturate your heart and soul as well.

NEIGHBORS HELPING NEIGHBORS

Neighbors Helping Neighbors (NHN) is not just a saying. It's a real community need and an opportunity for us all to reach out to our less fortunate neighbors. Located in the old Box Factory warehouse building, is an all-volunteer organization that provides nourishing meals and take home food for qualified families. This service has been provided since May 2016 and continues to grow, serving over 120 families per warehouse day. The food warehouse is open first and third Saturdays and free lunch is provided each Wednesday at Madison Heights Baptist Church and each Thursday at Ascension Episcopal in Amherst.

Much of the food distributed is donated by community businesses but this has to be supplemented by purchased food to fill out a typical family's food requirements. Cash donations (tax deductible) are always needed. Donations can be made through the church or directly to NHN.

NORTHMINSTER EVANGELICAL PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH (NEPC) SAFETY AND PREPAREDNESS RESOURCE TEAM

The purpose of this letter is to notify you, our congregation, of the renewed interest in addressing the issues of safety and security for our community, church family and friends. Recently the Amherst County Sheriff's Office advertised a community presentation on "Sanctuary...House of Worship Safety". In response to that advertisement, more than 120 people (including 3 representatives from NEPC), from churches of all denominations in Amherst and Nelson Counties attended to hear how the Sheriff's Department planned to meet their goal of "Making our place of worship safe-er". Instruction and discussion emphasized the renewed focus on the topic of church safety and security within our communities. We all left this presentation with a new/renewed understanding of what all churches need to be aware of as it related to safety and security.

In order to be prepared to respond to situations within or on our NEPC property a Safety and Preparedness Resource Team is being assembled to identify and implement such plans that would keep our congregation and property safe at all times. This team would be under the responsibility of the Session Property Committee.

In response to this community meeting, NEPC plans to do the following:

- 1. create NEPC Safety and Preparedness Resource Team
- 2. draft a Plan of Response for NEPC Safety and Preparedness (environmental and medical emergencies)
- 3. invite the Sheriff's department to come to NEPC for an on site survey and review of safety plan (if you would like to participate in this visit, please contact John D. Lange)
- 4. based on the above review, revise/amend/implement plans to improve the safety environment for all at NEPC

If you have an interest in providing input to and/or participating on this team, please notify John D. Lange, Property Chair (434-660-4856) or notify Vonnie Rucker, Church Secretary through the church office (434-929-2713). There are many within our congregation with backgrounds in health, safety and security. If there is someone you would recommend be on this team, let John Lange know so he can contact that individual personally.

Please consider being a part of this very important team for the safety and security of all at NEPC.

Points of concern needing regular review and periodic updates are as follows. This is not an all inclusive list but begins to bring to the forefront situations of priority. Additional situations will be addressed as needed:

- 1. Heart attack what to do, who to turn to?
- 2. Child and adult failure to breathe what to do who to turn to?
- 3. Falls resulting in unconsciousness what to do who to turn to?
- 4. Building and grounds design and upkeep as it relates to safety and security
- 5. Fire or explosions what to do who to turn to?
- 6. How to exit the building in various alarms and alerts what to do who to turn to?
- 7. Weapon on premises what to do who to turn to?
- 8. Questionable conduct and behavior by stranger what to do who to turn to?
- 9. Intruder alerts what to do who to turn to?
- 10. Intruder/s with intent to harm what to do who to turn to?
- 11. Who is responsible for call 911
- 12. Who is identified to monitor uninvited guests
- 13. Where are security cameras installed
- 14. Who monitors security cameras and when.
- 15. And the list goes on......
