Learning to Study the Scriptures

One of the core beliefs we hold as Christians is the authority and importance of the Bible. We believe it is divinely inspired, without error and fully authoritative for us and our lives. We also believe that Christians should regularly study and learn from the Bible. But much of how we do that is through sermons and Sunday school lessons, which usually involve someone (the preacher, for example) reading a passage, telling us (the congregation) what it means, and then how to apply it to our lives. It is, in many respects, a passive learning experience - knowledge and information is given to us to receive and absorb, and hopefully live. But we all learn best by doing ourselves, rather than someone doing the work for us (see the English proverb above).

Getting SOAPy

On Sunday evenings, the youth have started studying the books of the Bible. In doing so, we're seeking to teach them not simply what the Bible says and means, but more importantly how to study the Bible for themselves. I think the technique we're teaching them might be of benefit to you, particularly if you've struggled with how to study the Bible on your own. The method we're teaching is an acronym called SOAP - Scripture, Observation, Application and Prayer. Here's how it works:



Scripture

The first step is to identify a Scripture passage for study. It is generally good to Study one or two paragraphs - or about 6-10 verses — at a time. After selecting a passage, it is good to identify what Testament you are in (before or after Christ's birth), and what kind of literature you are reading (history, law, prophets, poetry, gospel, letters). It is helpful to copy the passage or key verses into a journal, as this increases comprehension and sets the stage for learning. Remember: You can Google any book of the Bible for answers to simple questions about that book.

Observation

Observation is taking time to look at the passage and ask questions to learn what it is saying. What are the commands to obey or examples to follow? What are the promises to claim? What does it teach me about God, Jesus, or the Holy Spirit? Take time to identify questions you may have that will lead to additional study. Write your observations and questions in your journal. Consider using a Bible handbook or simple commentary for further study.

Application

Do not stop with observations; take time to make applications. Ask: How will this truth change me or my family? Where do I fall short and who can help me? What will I change in my attitudes, relationships, and behaviors? What must I do today as a result of this study? How am I strengthened and encouraged by this passage? Record your applications in your journal.

Prayer

Conclude your Bible study with prayer. Ask God to help you apply the passage to life. Where do you need God's help or forgiveness? What are you thankful for in this passage of Scripture? Write the answers to these questions in your journal.

Learning to study the Bible is not difficult, but it takes practice and commitment. Like any good habit, the benefits of practicing regular Bible study, by yourself and in groups, make the effort of cultivating it worthwhile. It is my prayer that using a little SOAP in your study of the Bible will help you know God's Word and its importance for your life.

While these letters may be brief in length, they are long in content. If you, or your student, is between 6th and 12th grades, be sure to join us, each Sunday evening, from 6 to 7:15. Note: Youth Group will not meet Sunday, February 10 due to the winter retreat that weekend.

EVANGELISM TO THE END OF THE EARTH?

So...just how far does our Evangelism goal reach - personally and as a church? Psalm 2 speaks of the Nations and the Ends Of the Earth being of concern to God. He does not give us permission or the wiggle room to be concerned with only people in our community or our state or even just in our country. Chris Tiegreen reminds us that God has a "Holy Agenda" for the ends of the earth.

Chris goes on to ask these penetrating questions:

- Why can you go to a backwoods village in some far-off country and find icons of Western culture, but no church?
- In many areas of the world, why do the neon signs of soda companies shine brighter than the image of the Cross?
- Why do so many remote citizens of the world know the name of our tennis shoes, but not the name of the Savior?

It *appears* that our quest for a global <u>market</u> has driven us faster and farther than our quest for a global <u>salvation</u>.

Certainly our Enemy, Satan, tries to thwart us in many different ways. And - committing to Christ requires a radical change of heart, whereas being committed to a brand of sneakers or a style of music does not. Even so, there must be more than we can do.

Our Lord's heart extends to the nations. Does ours?

His mission will not let Him rest until every lonely goatherd in every remote valley is reached. Will ours? Corporate executives have found ways to saturate their market. Why haven't we?

A heart that loves the Savior will be passionate about His mission. A heart that loves the Savior will love what He loves and be committed to the same objective that motivated Him to give His life for the lost.

It's been said that the surest way to experience God's blessings is to pursue the same things God has demonstrated are important to Him. Here's praying our good Lord sees that in our lives - individually and as a church - in 2019.

CHURCH CANCELLATION -- IN CASE OF INCLEMENT WEATHER

Sunday Services:

PER-MEMBER ASKING FOR THE PRESBYTERY OF THE MID-ATLANTIC SUPPORT

The Presbytery of the Mid-Atlantic of the EPC asks its churches for their financial support in the amount of \$25 per Active Member. They call this the *EPC Per-Member Asking*. Although this is not mandatory, Northminster has pledged to financially support our denomination, realizing they have expenses just as we have. We have on several occasions reaped benefits from the Presbytery at no charge to us. Active members are asked if they can *voluntarily* give to this fund, beyond their regular tithe, once a year. If you are able to do so, please use a pew envelope or include \$25 in your offering envelope designating "EPC Per-Member Asking".

UPDATE - PCUSA DISMISSAL DEBT

The Officers are pleased to announce that we have paid our 4th annual dismissal payment to the Presbytery of the Peaks. As you know, we held a 3-year pledge campaign in 2015 with plans to hold another 3-year pledge campaign starting in 2019; however due to your faithful giving over the past 3 years, we feel like we can reach our goal within 1 more year. You will see below in the Financial Stewardship Report that we have \$44,288 towards the balance owed (\$60,000). If we are to have the full amount within the next year, we ask everyone who initially contributed toward the PC USA Dismissal Debt to continue to give their same amount for 1 more year.
