Pulling Together – for the Kingdom

He handed out gifts of apostle, prophet, evangelist, and pastor-teacher to train Christians in skilled servant work, working within Christ's body, the church, until we're all moving rhythmically and easily with each other, efficient and graceful in response to God's Son, fully mature adults, fully developed within and without, fully alive like Christ.— Eph. 4:11–13 (THE MESSAGE)

I've been watching a trend recently that has me concerned. It has become increasingly difficult to find people who are able and willing to serve in the various ministries and missions of the church. Our committees have been

shrinking and appeals for folks to get involved and help out have gone unanswered. As a pastor, I am concerned about this trend and spend much of my time praying about why this is and what we might do about it.

Perhaps you might be thinking, well, we are in a pandemic. We are discouraged from participating in the very things that are part-and-parcel of church ministry. This is true. But what the pandemic has done is accelerate what was already happening. Even in my short three years at Northminster, I've noticed a very steady decrease in volunteer activity in the church. The pandemic creates problems with solving this issue; it doesn't explain the cause.



A better diagnosis might be found in the reality that we are an aging congregation. Many of you have served the Kingdom of God and this congregation faithfully for decades. You have tirelessly poured yourselves out for the sake of Northminster, and have done so willingly and gladly. There are not enough words to express the gratitude I, and everyone else, feels for your service. You have earned a rest, and you deserve a rest.

The hard truth is that aging congregation or not, global pandemic or not, the work, ministry, and mission of the church goes forward. No church can function without its volunteers — for small churches like ours, though, it's more than essential. God has gathered this congregation together, and He has given each of us gifts and abilities meant to be used for the building up of the Body of Christ. An essential part of our growth as disciples, of our maturing as Christians, is putting into practice "skilled servant work" as we read above. In order for the church to be healthy, we all need to participate. How we go about that work might look a little bit different in the midst of a pandemic, but nevertheless the work goes on.

Why do I bring this up? For several reasons. While some ministries are still on hold due to the pandemic, others are still moving forward and we need folks to serve in those areas. One such example is the youth ministry — we have enough students and a broad enough age range that we need to have separate high school and middle school groups. But more than that, it's time to find our next class of elders to begin serving in 2021. We have two or three elder positions to fill. One of those positions has remained empty since I arrived in 2017. Each year, the challenge before the nominating committee to fill the open seats has increased. This year, we go about this work in the midst of a pandemic.

I invite you to search your heart humbly and prayerfully to see if the Holy Spirit is prompting you to step into one of those positions. Under normal circumstances, that can be an intimidating nudge. I know that under these circumstances it's even more so. I leave you with these verses to guide your prayers:

For this reason I remind you to fan into flame the gift of God, which is in you through the laying on of my hands, for God gave us a spirit not of fear but of power and love and self-control. — 2 Tim. 1:6–7

The saying is trustworthy: If anyone aspires to the office of overseer, he desires a noble task. -1 Tim. 3:1


Youth Group Is Back!

Things will be a little different this year because of COVID. We are going to ask each family to complete one or two boxes (or as many as they would like) by themselves and return them to the church by Sunday, November 1. There are a few boxes at the church now that can be picked up and signed out. However, the good news is that we can use the clear shoe boxes from the Dollar Store or we can just use a plain shoe box.

What NOT to Send

I think most of you know what to put in the shoebox so I am going to share what not to put in a box. Please do not put anything related to war, like small military figures, knives, or swords. Do not put any kind of food or toothpaste. Please do not put anything in that would break, like a snow globe. And there should not be any liquids or aerosol cans of any kind.

Monetary Support

We will also be taking monetary contributions for this project. When you put your offering in or send it electronically, please designate what you would like to donate to OCC. It will cost nine dollars a box to ship our boxes. Please let me know if you would

like for me to shop for you and pack your shoebox. I would be happy to do that.

Sharing Our Blessings!

I also wanted to remind you that the boxes go all over the world to children who often do not have many material goods and who may have never heard about Jesus. Not only do these boxes bring joy to the children, but OCC volunteers tell them about Jesus and send them home with a New Testament in their own language. Twenty-seven years after OCC began, the boxes have been delivered to 168 million children in 100 countries and we have been a part of this ministry for many years! 
CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT INITIATIVE

In the past few months your session has been considering the continued property needs of our church. Most recently the air conditioning in the Fellowship Hall had to be replaced at the cost of approximately \$4,000. Other areas of concern include the following:

- Paving of the entrance and front parking lot
- Removal of dying tree in rear of property in the rear parking lot
- **Updating** plumbing and fixtures in the bathroom
- Concerns for the failure and replacement of A/C systems serving the classroom building and the system on the organ side of the sanctuary
- Needed refinishing of remaining linoleum floors
- Continued ability to address unexpected building issues

Over the past 5 years, we have spent a considerable amount in capital improvements, including:

- 1. **New A/C units** for the office areas, vestibule and Tatman room (\$10,980+-)
- 2. Refinishing Fellowship Hall floors (\$602+-)
- 3. **Leveling** of concrete entrance walks to the classroom building (\$2,025+-)
- 4. **Repairs** to protective coverings of stained-glass sanctuary windows (\$3,100+-)
- 5. Cleaning of church steeple (\$850+-)
- 6. **New entrance sign** and front of church name signage (\$9,600.00+-)
- 7. **Roof replacement** of classroom building (\$11,000+-)
- 8. **Repair** of damage classroom ceiling (\$2,150+-)
- 9. Live streaming video equipment (\$3,500+-)
- 10. **As needed repairs** of A/C systems, plumbing issues and other minor issues addressed as required.



The above improvements have nearly depleted our Capital Improvement funds. This list is not all of the money spent on building maintenance, but only focuses on larger items. This isn't to say that the Capital Fund has fully funded all of the items listed above. Funding has come through the selfless giving of honorariums, anonymous gifts, and designated contributions in times of need. As evidenced by the completion of the many building/property issues, we have been truly blessed.

Based on the desire to meet the needs of our church as identified in the bulleted items above, your session has decided to initiate a Capital Improvement endeavor. The intent is to strengthen our Capital Improvement Fund in order to move forward with the listed items.

Recently, quotes for the paving of the front entrance and parking area ranged from \$25,000 to \$35,000. Because of the amount of money involved your session felt it was prudent to establish a Capital Improvement Fund Drive. While your session feels the parking lot is a priority issue, we realize other maintenance needs may arise before funds are available for the parking lot. Therefore, this general Capital Improvement Fund Drive has been instituted.

Typically, a Capital Campaign has a defined monetary objective and timeline; however, this one is a little bit different. While the session would like you to consider meeting these identified needs within the next 3 to 5 years, there is no particular timeline for this campaign. Additionally, a total monetary goal has not been set because the needs will change over time. Initially, we are hoping to meet the cost of constructing a formal asphalt parking area and entrance to our church, which is estimated to be around \$35,000. Should other issues arise during the accumulation of funds, the use of available funds would have to be applied to that immediate need, thus delaying the completion of the original goal.

The leadership would like to remind you that capital campaigns are in addition to your regular, annual giving. It is important that we continue with our regular tithes and offerings in order to maintain the proper functioning of our church. However, it is also important to recognize the need to commit to the maintenance of our property that will soon be ours "lock, stock, and barrel." It is to achieve that latter goal that we are instituting this Capital Improvement Fund Drive.

This letter is written so you can clearly understand the intent of your leadership in meeting the needs of service to the congregation and community. You are encouraged to discuss this matter with your session members, Pastor, and other congregants. We need to move forward to address such building/property needs.

In order to identify your contributions offered for this "Capital Improvement Fund" you can do one of the following:

- identify any contribution as "CIF" or write out "Capital Improvement Fund"
- if a check, write on the memo line "Capital Improvement Fund" or "CIF"
- an online option will be made available for "Capital Improvement Fund"
- specify "Capital Improvement Fund" or "CIF" on your offering envelope
- use a pew envelope and write "Capital Improvement Fund" on the envelope
- place cash in an envelope designated for "Capital Improvement Fund"

The next time offering envelopes are ordered and distributed there will be a specific line item listed on the envelope for the "Capital Improvement Fund."
