A Season of Promise

"Behold, the days are coming, declares the LORD, when I will fulfill the promise I made to the house of Israel and the house of Judah. In those days and at that time I will cause a righteous Branch to spring up for David, and he shall execute justice and righteousness in the land. In those days Judah will be saved, and Jerusalem will dwell securely. And this is the name by which it will be called: 'The LORD is our righteousness.'" — Jeremiah 33:14-16



Advent is one of the most popular seasons in the church calendar; it's certainly one of mine. Of course, culturally it's popular because it means Christmas is coming and most of us look at Advent as a time to prepare for the celebration of that holiday. But there is a depth and richness to Advent, an irony even, that runs much deeper than merely getting ready for Christmas. "Advent" is a Latin word that means "coming" or "arrival." Yes, it is a season of preparing to celebrate Christ's first coming 2,000 years ago, but even more it is a season of preparation for Christ's return. This dual focus makes Advent a season of promise — promise fulfilled and promise yet to come.

As foretold in Jeremiah (and Isaiah and the other prophets), the incarnation of Jesus Christ was the fulfillment of God's promises to redeem His people from sin and exile and restore His Kingdom on earth in a fuller and more beautiful way than ever before. As the New Testament makes clear, every one of God's promises about the Messiah were fulfilled in Jesus Christ. Every single one. We can spend our entire lives contemplating the wonder of God's promises fulfilled in the incarnation of Christ and find there are always more depths to explore, which is why Advent is necessary to help us prepare to celebrate the birth of our Savior.

What no one expected, though, was that the birth, life, and death of Jesus Christ was just the beginning, the inauguration, of that work. The completion and consummation of that work is yet to come, which is why we also use this season to prepare for the glorious return of our Savior. As certainly as He came the first time, He will surely come again. The guarantee of His return is that He already came, along with how many times He said He would return (Matthew 16:27; Luke 12:40; John 14:3; Acts 1:11; Revelation 22:20, to list just a few). A full and complete celebration of Advent and Christmas not only looks back, but also looks ahead, anticipating the joyous return of our Savior and the consummation of the Kingdom of God.

Advent is the season that shines brightly the hope, love, joy, and peace of Jesus Christ in the darkness of this world. The irony of Advent is this: as the cold of winter sets in and the leaves fall and flowers die, as the dark of winter grows longer each day, Advent reminds us that death has been defeated (1 Corinthians 15: 54-57) and the Light of Jesus Christ continues to shine forth and cannot be overcome (John 1:1-14). God will be faithful, and the promise of this season will bear fruit. So this Advent, hold fast your hope. Love, because He first loved us. Rejoice in your salvation now and your salvation yet to come. Rest, knowing that God has brought you peace, even in the midst of your enemies.

We invite you to join us in worship throughout the season of Advent as we explore *The Promises of Christmas*.

Let us draw near with a true heart in full assurance of faith, with our hearts sprinkled clean from an evil conscience and our bodies washed with pure water. Let us hold fast the confession of our hope without wavering, for he who promised is faithful. And let us consider how to stir up one another to love and good works, not neglecting to meet together, as is the habit of some, but encouraging one another, and all the more as you see the Day drawing near. — Hebrews 10:22-25





WHAT IS YOUR FAVORITE CHRISTMAS CAROL?



Last year at Christmas, Northminster had a wonderful time when we visited members and friends who are homebound. At each location, we sang such Christmas carols as "O Come All Ye Faithful," "Joy to the World," "Away in a Manger," as well as lighthearted fun songs like "Santa Claus is Coming to Town" and "Jingle Bells." We also asked those we were visiting what they would like to hear—what was their favorite Christmas Carol. It was quite interesting - "Silent Night, Holy Night" was the unanimous choice!

The much-loved carol 'Silent Night' was first performed on Christmas Eve, 1818. Originally it was sung to a simple guitar accompaniment. The carol began life as a poem, written in 1816 by Father Joseph Mohr. Two years later, his friend Franz Gruber set the poem to music and the pair first sang the carol at midnight mass on Christmas Eve. Mohr's manuscript was lost, leading to confusion about the song's authorship, until his handwritten version resurfaced in 1995. By then, 'Silent Night' had been translated into over 300 languages and was a worldwide Christmas phenomenon.

Be sure to join us **Sunday, December 17, from 4 to 6:30 p.m**. when we once again go Christmas caroling. We'll be sure to sing your favorite Christmas carols too!



What Difference Can We Make

As a small church, we often wonder what kind of a difference we can actually make. In a community and world with so much need, how can we, with our limited resources, make a meaningful impact?

The Miracle of Multiplication

In Mark 6, a large crowd follows Jesus and his disciples to a desolate place. Having compassion on them, Jesus begins to teach them. As the day moves to a close, the disciples encourage Jesus to send the people home, as there was nowhere to eat nearby. Instead, Jesus tells the disciples to give the people something to eat. How could they possibly do this? They are too few, and the crowd far too great. Jesus asks them to see how much food was brought with the crowd. All they are able to gather are five loaves of bread and two fish. Jesus takes this meager offering, blesses it, and begins to break it apart and distribute it to the crowd. When all is said and done, everyone is full, with twelve baskets of leftovers! Mark says that the crowd consisted of 5,000 men, which easily puts the total number over 10,000 people. It's an incredible miracle that demonstrates we follow a God of ridiculous abundance and provision. He takes the little we have to offer and works miracles.

We have often seen God do this through our support of Daystar Junior School in the Makindye division of Kampala, Uganda. What is little to us becomes abundance for them. Daystar Junior School opened in 2015 with 197 students. Our relationship with Jude began when he visited our church in the fall of 2017. When Jude visited us in 2017, they had 395. This year, 2023, Daystar has 923 registered students — all squeezed into a mere 15 classes. To say the school is

operating at capacity is an understatement. They are in desperate need of new facilities.

The Lord has given Jude a vision of a new building, one that can be built in levels, one at a time as funds become available. To build the first floor, the school needs \$150,000 in US dollars. The second floor would be an additional \$130,000. Such a building would cost many times that in the United States.

Turning Bread into Buildings

We are a small church, but we believe strongly in the work Daystar and Jude are doing in their community. To that end, we are seeking to raise \$100,000 for Daystar by December 31, 2023. An anonymous donor has generously offered to match any funds donated through Northminster for Daystar, up to that \$100,000 by the end of the year. If we reach our goal, Daystar will have enough for the first floor of the new education building and most of what is needed for the second.
