A Slow But Steady Process

"Come now, let us reason together," says the Lord: "though your sins are like scarlet, they shall be as white as snow; though they are red like crimson, they shall become like wool." — Isaiah 1:18

Being the snow lover that I am, I delighted in our most recent winter storm. While far from the largest snow, it was the most we've received in a couple of years and more than enough to blanket everything in a beautiful coating of white. It was a slow process that took most of the day, so slow you almost couldn't see it happening. But surely enough, as the hours ticked by, the world was transformed into a beautiful winter wonderland.



As I watched the snow falling and the slow transformation of everything, I thought of the passage from Isaiah quoted above. No matter how deep our sins, God's grace will cover them like snow. Isaiah uses the color red for sin because "without the shedding of blood there is no forgiveness of sins" (Heb 9:22). The more crimson the color, the worse the sin. And yet, no matter how crimson our sins might be, they've all been paid for, atoned for, by the shed blood of our Savior, Jesus Christ. Our souls are made as pure white as a fresh snowfall.

But we aren't finished with our sin, are we? Even though our forgiveness and salvation are assured, as long as we're on this side of Glory, we continue to wrestle with our sinful nature. As Martin Luther famously said, "We are at once justified and sinful." Our journey with Jesus is a journey of becoming ever more sanctified (which means holy, or more like Jesus) and ever less sinful. Sometimes we make great strides toward holiness; sometimes we slide back into our sins. It's a process, a journey, and it takes time – kind of like how it takes time for the world to turn white while the snow falls.

When the snow first started, the ground was still fairly warm. Most of the snow melted immediately. In fact, a lot of the snow melted before the ground cooled enough for the snow to begin to stick. The tree branches were the first to collect the snow, but roads took a lot longer, and even when the snow began to stick, the roads first turned to a mushy grey. Puddles in the yard where the already melted snow collected held out for as long as they could, but even they eventually froze and were covered over with snow. Yet the snow was persistent and relentless, persevering until all was remade under a beautiful white blanket.

It is the Holy Spirit that is restoring our souls, one day at a time, moment by moment. Just like the snowfall, the Holy Spirit is persistent and relentless with you. Often, you might not notice that anything is changing at all. But over time, as we continue to walk with the Lord in faithfulness and pursue Him in all things, we'll begin to notice that we aren't who we used to be, that our soul is gradually becoming more and more pure and white. Set your mind and your heart on the things of God, and freely confess your sins — old, new, even the repeats —so He can "purge you with hyssop" so you can "hear joy and gladness" in your soul.




Temptation is never easy to deal with, and it's always more insidious than we expect. This is a don't-miss series. Be sure and be there.





Don & Joan Ricketts Body Life Fund

Following the lead of Pastor Ray Steadman in his book, *Body Life*, Northminster seeks to be the body of Christ. One way of doing this is by reaching out not only to people in our community, but also assisting members of our own congregation who find themselves in a financial crisis.

When a family in the church has special needs that they are unable to meet, perhaps due to losing a job, or some sort of crisis, money from the Body Life Fund can be requested to help. While money does not usually solve people's problems, it can be a source of great encouragement to a family that is struggling through a crisis. Although the church cannot fully support a family that is out of work, any financial help is usually appreciated greatly, and tells them that the church truly cares.

Over the past several years, we been blessed to be able to provide special assistance to many in our congregation. As a result, the balance in the fund right now is very low. Minute 4 Missions: Burundi Hope Project

"Open My Eyes," a hymn written by Panam Percy Paul, comes to mind when thinking of Burundi and the mission we help to support there. The song begins with a plea to God saying, "Open my eyes that I may see, glimpses of truth Thou hast for me." It continues on with the words: "Open my ears that I may hear voices of truth Thou sendest clear." This is what is happening with the Burundi Hope Project at the Kanura School for the Blind and at the Ephphatha Deaf School. The students literally cannot hear or see!

In 2004, Mark and Susan May had a vision to establish the Burundi Hope Project which enabled them to establish schools for 220 deaf or blind students and their teachers. Mark and Susan have a heart for serving children with special needs; now they both serve as short-term missionaries in Burundi. Living in Amherst County and being one of our own, makes this project special to us. Therefore, Northminster has supported them in their mission for a number of years. We have seen them here at our church many times when they have given us updates on how the work there is progressing. They are our friends. And most importantly, supporting their work is one way Northminster can fulfill God's mission of spreading the Word throughout the nations of the world.

Mission strategy has changed through the years. In the past, missionaries went and never came back home. Today's strategy allows the people in Burundi to take ownership of their projects, with missionaries becoming more or less advisors. When in Madison Heights, Susan and Mark work with folks in Burundi by way of the Internet. Then, at least twice a year, sometimes more, they do short-term mission trips. Besides the schools, Mark and Susan have also seen the people establish a fish farm, a sewing center, a chicken business, and new churches. Burundi Hope also provides training for pastors and teachers.



From New Year's Resolutions to Lenten Activities: 40 Items in 40 Days

As I write this newsletter article, it is late January. Often at this time, many of us who made New Year's resolutions a month ago now begin to assess how well (or poorly) the new changes we've made are going. One of my favorite resolutions (I make it every year!) is to declutter my home.

It was almost 30 years ago when my husband and I first married and combined two households of possessions into one home. All this stuff, along with new furniture, electronics, clothing, cat toys, and other belongings acquired over the years have really piled up. (The garage has **never** had room for a car!)

I've made progress with my New Year's decluttering resolution this January and like the results! When I mentioned this to my sister, she told me about a Lenten activity she recently read about. Here's how it works:

40 Items in 40 Days

Each day from Ash Wednesday (Feb. 14) until Easter (March 31), gather one item from your home to donate. This can be clothing, books, furniture, household items, or anything in good condition which you no longer need and that others can benefit from. Collect the items in a bag (or bags), and when Easter comes, donate them to a worthwhile charity or to someone in need.

This idea intrigued me, so I did internet research for more information and found tons of articles. There are many variations on this decluttering activity. For example, one involved filling up one trash bag each day during Lent with items to toss (40 Bags in 40 Days). That's just too ambitious for me!


Here is an excerpt from the article:
